

Australian apprenticeships and traineeships

What is an apprenticeship and/or traineeship?

Apprenticeships and traineeships combine training with working in a real job, with a real boss, for a real wage. Apprentices and trainees work towards the completion of a nationally recognised qualification while learning valuable skills at work and under the guidance of a training organisation. Upon completion, you may find yourself in a great place to keep working, go on to future study; or even start your own business.

What is the difference between a trainee and apprentice?

Apprentices are trained in a skilled trade (e.g. electrical, plumbing, cabinet making, automotive) and, upon successful completion, become a qualified tradesperson. Apprenticeships generally take up to 4 years to complete. Trainees are trained in vocational areas (e.g. business administration, information technology, tourism) and, upon successful completion, receive a qualification in their chosen vocational area.

Traineeships generally take between 12 months and 3 years to complete.





What is self-employment and entrepreneurship?

Self-employment and entrepreneurship is when you work for yourself as a freelancer or you are the owner of your own business, rather than working for someone else.

You may contract out your services to an individual or organisation, rather than being hired as a direct employee; or work for yourself in your own business. You will need to register for a free Australian Business Number (ABN) and directly invoice the client for services/products you provide.

You may have an online business through a website, a Facebook or Instagram account, or a YouTube channel etc. and get paid electronically through BPay or something similar. Again, you would need an ABN and declare any earnings.

The 'gig economy' is a term used to refer to the increased amount of contract, temporary, flexible and freelance work. Uber drivers and Deliveroo couriers are examples of workers in the gig economy. Websites such as Freelancer, Fiverr and Upwork are popular online platforms for connecting people to the gig economy (i.e. either outsourcing your skills, or, hiring a contractor to provide you a service).

Self-employment may be a viable option if you have a unique skill, or to supplement other forms of employment. You would need to do your own research about things like Superannuation and Workers' Compensation.

Support for young entrepreneurs

The ASE Group is made up of two group divisions, the Australian School of Employment, and the Australian School of Entrepreneurship. The Australian School of Entrepreneurship provides school students, young adults and anyone aged 16 to 24 years of age with free access to ondemand online training, short courses and essential adulting skills not taught in traditional classrooms.

Alternative/flexible schools

Alternative/Flexible schools are designed to support youth from disadvantaged backgrounds who may have departed the mainstream school system. They recognise that many young people have complex lives which makes it difficult to attend school regularly. Alternative and Flexible schools have implemented strategies to ensure that factors that work against young people attending school are minimised.

These strategies include support with transport, housing assistance, food, daycare, showers, access to legal aid, court support, Centrelink negotiations, links to local Indigenous community organisations, and domestic violence assistance.

Apprenticeship and traineeship funding (User Choice)

Apprenticeships and traineeships combine training with practical experience in a paying job.
Apprentices and trainees complete a nationally recognised qualification while learning skills at work and under the guidance of a registered training organisation (RTO).

Apprenticeships and traineeships combine work with study, so you earn while you learn. As an apprentice or trainee, you'll learn practical skills at work, academic skills through a

training organisation and at the end, graduate with a trade qualification or vocational certificate.

Subsidised training opportunities are available as part of doing an apprenticeship or traineeship.

Free Apprenticeships for under 25s

If you are under 25, the Queensland Government will cover the cost of your training with a training provider when you choose a high priority apprenticeship or traineeship.

Just choose from the list of more than 130 priority apprenticeship and traineeship qualifications offered, land an apprenticeship or traineeship with an employer between 1 January 2021 and 31 December 2024, and the cost of your training will be covered.

Certificate 3 Guarantee

The Certificate 3 Guarantee supports eligible individuals to complete their first post-school certificate III level qualification and increase their skills to move into employment, re-enter the workforce or advance their career.

The program also supports school students to access training and Queensland's Year 12 graduates to transition to employment by providing free training in high priority qualifications.

Under the Certificate 3 Guarantee, the Queensland Government provides a subsidy for a range of certificate III level vocational qualifications.

Back to Work

Back to Work provides an opportunity for jobseekers and those at risk of unemployment to upskill and retrain for jobs to keep pace with a changing Queensland economy.

Youth Boost – Youth Boost Payments of up to \$20,000 are available for employers who hire an eligible young unemployed jobseeker, aged between 15–24 years.

Back to Work Support – Back to Work Support Payments of up to \$15,000 are available for employers who hire an eligible unemployed job seeker from the identified target groups.

The Certificate 3 Guarantee Plus (C3GPlus) provides eligible jobseekers with funding for training to help secure local jobs. Training may include 'second chance' training for jobseekers or workers who already have a Certificate 3 (or higher) level qualification but need or want new or updated skills to gain, change or retain employment.

University

Bachelor's degrees are the most common qualification undertaken at university and typically take three years of full-time study to complete. They introduce students to general fields of study rather than teaching specific skills needed for specific jobs.

Undergraduate degrees are most commonly studied at university, although some private higher education providers and TAFE also deliver them.

QTAC

The Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre (QTAC) operates a centralised tertiary application service for:

- > Publicly funded Queensland universities
- > Bond University Medicine
- > TAFE Queensland
- > Australian Maritime College
- Some courses at publicly funded universities in northern New South Wales
- > Some private tertiary education providers.

The institutions have complete control in determining their own entry requirements.

QTAC assesses applications using these entry requirements and then make offers to successful applicants during their offer rounds.

As well as managing applications for the above institutions, QTAC publishes course information for some institutions that accept their own applications directly.

The VET Student Loans program is a temporary income loan offered by the Australian Government that helps eligible students pay for some VET diploma level or above courses.

Opening a bank account

If you want to open your own bank account here are a few things you will need:

- > Tax File Number (TFN)
- > Proof of permanent address
- Identification (ID) check with your bank what I.D you need (e.g. photo ID, birth certificate).

Once your account is active, you can then manage your money by registering for telephone or internet banking.

When you open a bank account, you should make sure you read and understand the fine print. Never open a bank account without first reading the product information and understanding the terms and conditions and the various fees that might apply.

Terms and conditions outline the rules and regulations that apply on how you use the account. If you don't understand them, ask your bank to explain them to you.

Tax File Number

What is a Tax File Number?

A Tax File Number (TFN) is your personal reference number in the tax and superannuation systems. Your TFN is an important part of your tax and super records as well as your identity, so keep it secure. Your TFN is yours for life. You keep the same TFN even if you change your name, change jobs, move interstate, or go overseas.

You don't have to have a TFN, but without one, you pay more tax. You also won't be able to apply for government benefits, lodge your tax return electronically or get an Australian Business Number (ABN).

Superannuation

Superannuation is a tax-effective way to save for your retirement. Employees contribute a portion of your wage into your superannuation account which will grow until retirement or withdrawal.



Medicare card

Ever wonder what your Medicare card is actually for? When you show healthcare providers your Medicare card, you can receive free or cheaper health services from people such as doctors, specialists and optometrists. Places you can use your Medicare card include bulk billing doctors, public hospitals and even the pharmacy or chemist where you buy your medicine. You can get cheaper medicine using your Medicare card if your prescriptions are covered by the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (which includes most common medicines that your doctor recommends).

If you are applying for a Medicare card through a Medicare Office, you should take two forms of identification with you (eg. a birth certificate, student card, healthcare card, driver's licence or passport). You can also choose to stay on your parent's card and have a copy made to keep with you.

You don't need identification to do this. This is called the 'duplicate' Medicare card. You only need to ask your parents or carers to call or visit Medicare to get you your 'duplicate' Medicare card.

Confirmation of Aboriginality

You may be asked for your confirmation of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander Heritage when you apply for a service or program. These services or programs may include a job you are applying for, scholarships, university, school programs or grants.

In order to obtain your confirmation of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander heritage you will need to:

- > Complete an application
- > You must be able to show your connection to your Aboriginal and/ or Torres Strait Islander heritage through documentation such as

- family history documents, oral stories, photos and/or connection to a particular community.
- > Make contact with an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander organisation. The board of the organisation will only consider your application if a member of the board knows your family heritage. You can also contact the Aboriginal Land Council from which your family connection is linked to.

Learner Driving Exemption

- No car is reasonably available for you to learn to drive
- No supervisor is reasonably available to supervise your driving

Applying for a rental property

If you have found a property you would like to rent, the next step is to complete an application form. The application form is a way of showing the landlord or agent that you are the best candidate for the property. The application is reviewed against other candidates, so it is important to make sure yours stands out.

To submit an application to rent a house, you will normally need to provide the following:

- > Reference and contact details
- > Bank statements
- A current employment contract, recent payslips, and employer contact details
- > Photocopies of several items of personal identification
- > Cover letter.

Your rights as a tenant

Once you have found a property you would like to rent, prior to moving, your agent or rental provider must provide you with a written tenancy agreement. You must also be provided with a copy of the RTA information booklet ('pocket guide') that applies to your tenancy (this is not required for rooming only accommodation).

As a tenant, you should also be provided with a prepared Entry Condition Report so you can record the conditions of the premises prior to moving in. The agent or provider must ensure the rental property is clean and in good repair when you move in; and the premises is reasonably

secured and fit to live in. Make sure you keep a copy of all forms, receipts, and agreements regarding the residence. Take photos with time and date stamp of any damage and notify the agent or provider before taking up residence, so that you are not held liable for this later.


