Passion for pastries

with croissant craftsmanship





ouble-beef burgers, salmon crolls and cheesecakes are now varieties of creative croissants in a new Hillcrest bakery that has customers from all over South East Queensland queuing out the door.

Whether it's cruffins, crookies, cronuts or crolls, the new Croix Croissant bakery and cafe is making life sweeter for locals and tourists alike with delectable twists to the traditional buttery treat.

The owners, husband-and-wife team Audi and Rizka Krisnandika, are taking traditional croissants to a whole new level of tastebud temptation to put Logan on the foodie map.

It's the latest quality bakery to open in Logan, and the couple is proud to be drawing in new customers to visit the city. They are also pleased to be bringing international trends to the area, by recreating the latest treats on social media around the world.

'If something goes viral in Paris, people want to try it in Logan so that's what we try to bring,' Rizka says. 'We take inspiration from everywhere – if it's doable, why not? – we like to experiment.'

The couple's Indonesian heritage has also influenced some menu items, such as a green croissant enhanced with pandan – a South-East Asian plant with a mild, earthy vanilla flavour – which, as Rizka explains, is part of sharing the couple's food culture with locals. Another was a Mi Goreng croissant that was a huge hit in their Melbourne store, which they opened 18 months ago in Flemington.

When the pair moved to Queensland with their 3 young sons to be closer to family, they decided to open their second store at the Middle Road Village Shopping Centre in Hillcrest – now a must-visit location for flaky pastry fans.

'Growth here is way faster than Melbourne, which is surprising. We have people from the Gold Coast and around Brisbane coming all the way to Logan to try our pastries, which feels amazing – they say it's worth the drive because they are overwhelmed by the choice,' Rizka says.

The hand-rolled croissants are created during a traditional 3-day process, with 15 to 20 varieties on offer daily, totalling around 2,000 each week.

'We have the classic crème brûlée croissant, the double-beef burger croll with cheese and burger sauce is really popular, and the lemon cheesecake cruffin is a best-seller,' Rizka says.

'The crookie has also just taken off world-

wide, starting in Paris, and it is a real favourite with the kids.'

For the uninitiated in baked goods terminology, Rizka explains that a cruffin is a mixture of a croissant and muffin, a croll is a croissant and roll combo, and a crookie is a croissant with cookie dough inside and on top.

The recipes are by Audi, who was studying commercial cookery when he met Rizka, then an accountant. 'We got married and then I realised I liked cooking far more than accounting so I also did a cooking course,' Rizka laughs.

They began manufacturing tempeh and ran a cafe until COVID-19 lockdowns, followed by home deliveries of doughnuts and croissants.

Audi, who grew up loving croissants due to his extended family living in France for 5 years, then perfected the croissant recipe and the couple realised a croissant café was their shared passion.

Lights, camera, Logan!

n a first for Logan, a new film festival is about to raise the curtain on local filmmakers and celebrate their diverse stories.

This September, Underdog Film Fest is set to become the launching pad for Logan's emerging filmmakers and film students to premiere their creative talents.

Film Fest participants will have the opportunity to develop filmmaking skills at group workshops and gain industry connections – all in their own backyard.

According to talented filmmaker and Film Fest judge, Lark Lee, the event will be a coup for Logan's fledgling film industry.

'I'm excited to see what Logan filmmakers are doing and I really want to help them grow,' Lark says.

'Everyone on the team has been working really, really hard to create a base for young filmmakers.

'Who knows, the next famous director could be born in Logan.'

The judging panel – which includes other notable figures such as Sally Terare, a First Nations artist and consultant – embodies the festival's ideals of inclusivity and accessibility.

Lark, a Korean-Australian mother based in Springwood, has been enjoying a boom in film projects after receiving funding in 2021.

With support from the Queensland Government and Logan City Council, she was able to create the first short version of Street No. 4, a horror film inspired by supernatural Korean mythology within an Australian setting.

'The short film attracted serious interest and I'm quite happy with the response,' she says.

'Funding from Council was so helpful – without the grant, the quality wouldn't have been as good as it was.'

Street No. 4 has since accumulated rave reviews and awards on the international film festival route and is set to be made into a feature film in the near future.

Her latest project, Mother's Table, depicts multigenerational relationships within Asian families and was recently streamed on SBS On Demand.

As part of SBS and Screen Australia's Digital Originals Initiative, Lark is also working on a new drama series, Little Korea, about Korean migrant stories.

One of the Underdog Film Fest founders, Ali Strachan, is delighted by the calibre of the judging panel and Logan's potential to play more of a starring role in the film world.

'The festival is about providing a bridge between local film practitioners and the bigger industry, because this is something we've been lacking in Logan,' Ali says.

'Our vision is to create accessible pathways into this booming industry to build the local film sector.'

The event is supported by the Queensland Government via the Gambling Community Benefit Fund, Screen Queensland and Logan City Council's Community Event funding.

Double the leader

oganlea State High School students have the double bonus of twin sisters for their 2024 school captains this year.

Marsden sisters Gabrielle and Sheikinah Kibaja have been chosen as Year 12 school captains and are becoming proud role models, especially for students of African heritage – including their 3 younger siblings.

'We are Congolese and hadn't really seen a lot of people from our background as school leaders over the years, so we were like "let's try and increase the diversity and show these kids that they can be leaders too", 'Gabrielle says.

'For us being African, we see a lot of students are scared of a leadership role, so we want to change that.'

Their principal, Brenton Farleigh, says the girls have exceptional leadership qualities.

'Gabrielle demonstrates remarkable academic prowess, consistently achieving outstanding results and exercising leadership through her strong intellect.' Mr Farleigh says.

'Sheikinah's leadership style is characterised by warmth, approachability, and an innate ability to uplift those in her presence, fostering a positive environment where individuals feel valued and empowered.'

Both favour maths and science and wish to study allied health or nursing at university.

'With my background of a heart health issue, I want to give back something to help people,' Sheikinah says.

Gabrielle says the captain roles – which they share with students Alicia Bailey and Gabrielle Blanckensee – are growing their confidence and self-belief. 'But it's more about showing people they can do this too,' she says.

Following in her parents' footsteps, Margaret has given countless hours fundraising and establishing outreach initiatives to support those experiencing homelessness, social isolation and loneliness.

She hopes to pass this mindset on to the next generation, beginning with her grandchildren.

'One of my favourite moments was with my beautiful granddaughters, when I took them out with me during Christmas time to see Rosies and how it worked,' Margaret says.

'They could see how lucky they were with a good family, warm bed and plenty of food – not everyone has that. It gave them the insight that not everyone is as well off as them and that they can be of help.'

S aving a life is a rare occurrence for most – especially when the rescuers are children.

At ages 4 and 6, brothers Tegh and Rabbi Virdi are already among those rare few, by saving another 4-year-old from drowning in a swimming pool during a Gold Coast holiday.

Their instinct to help the boy out of the water was recently celebrated when Save A Mate swimming safety identity Laurie Lawrence handed the boys Kids Alive medals at Logan Swim

School – where the brothers take lessons.

Their mother, Simran Virdi, says the rescue was 'a heart-stopping moment'.

'Yet seeing how promptly Rabbi and Tegh responded fills me with immense pride,' she says.

Defying expectations **GRAVITY**

is teacher said it couldn't be done, yet 13-year-old Rodney Young successfully built an oscilloscope for his science project.

The instrument is used to design basic electronic systems, and Rodney continued to meet naysayers throughout his life – even as he failed courses in high school and dropped out of university.

However, he always believed he'd end up being an entrepreneur – and this tenacity is how Rodney built his successful business developing solutions for the likes of Boeing Defence Australia.

Rodney is now the managing director of Kingston-based company Masters & Young, a designer and manufacturer of world-class electronic products and devices.

The company specialises in designing and assembling electronics that require complex engineering for use in difficult environments such as underground mines, space and military battlefields.

'We've launched rockets to test hypersonic equipment in South Australia,' Rodney says.

'We built all the electronics – even the people at Woomera were astounded that it was done by a little "small" firm in Woodridge.

'We often get the opportunity to tell other states that our gear is Australian and Logan-made.'

It all began in 1997 when Rodney co-founded the company with Scott Masters and \$1000 in credit.

'One of our employees knew a customer had a problem and I was able to solve it quickly, which got us a job that financed the company,' Rodney says.

Typical of successful entrepreneurs, Rodney has always had a penchant for problem-solving.

'I've always been tinkering, always been good with my hands, always had a workshop to work in and always wanted to play with science-y things,' he says. Rodney hopes to instill the same love of learning in the next generation of young entrepreneurs.

'We often get high school students wondering if they should drop out of school. I say "all you've got to do is pass commerce, English, science, and be nice to your teacher – then you'll get to grow up and do things".

'It's about getting people excited not just about science, but the can-do and how to get there.'

He cites an example of recently taking 15 staff to an electronics show in Melbourne. 'No engineers, no gods, but the real people who do the soldering, so they can learn more about the industry,' Rodney says.

'Most firms bring their CEOs and CFOs, but we bring the most important people.'

The company's Chief of Operations, Warren Hobbs, says they are blessed with a team of highly-skilled engineers and technicians who really love the work they do.



Success is brewing in Eagleby

ike its award-winning lagers, Eagleby's Perentie Brewing Co. is rising to the top in Queensland's beer scene.

After just 2 months up and running, the emerging brewery – which can churn out one million litres of beer per year – scooped 8 medals at the Royal Queensland Beer Awards on 29 February.

Owner Kenton Campbell, best known as the founder of Zarraffa's Coffee, says the accolades were a pleasant surprise.

'What doesn't surprise me is that we were in with a chance from the beginning, as everything we do is at a high level,' Kenton says.

'We followed the philosophy that if you have the best equipment, ingredients and team, you have a very good chance of producing something that is top-notch and that's what we've been able to do.'

His venture into the industry has been years in the making.

As a beer buff with a predilection for German lagers and Japanese beers, Kenton's goal was to create a beverage of quality that balanced tradition with modern technique.

He turned to one of the best for guidance – Burleigh Brewing's brew master, Brennan Fielding.

'Lagers are the most complicated types of beers to produce, but it was the most uncomplicated decision for me to produce them because it's just such a good beer,' Kenton says.

His personal favourite is the Pure Crisp – which claimed the coveted Champion Lager gong in the Awards – which he keeps in kegs at home.

'We gather the best authentic ingredients from around the world, where these sorts of beers have been around for hundreds of years, and follow a cold ferment, 4-week traditional lager brewing process, which then gets filtered and poured into our tanks,' Kenton says.

'After that it gets kegged, canned or poured straight into your glass at Perentie Brewing Co.'

The brewery, in Distillery Road Market Precinct, has been fizzing with activity from visitors near and far.

'This is what I always dreamed about with this project – seeing a sea of people coming together and having a good time with friends and family,' Kenton says.

'The local community has always been supportive and I thank them for that.

'In time, this place will be "the place" in South East Queensland, because what we're creating is world-class and it's so great to see our Logan locals and beyond visiting us.

'We have music, cold brews and markets – there's something for everyone.'

Acoustic tour for Eskimo Joe fans

tripped back and bareboned' and even a little exposed, is what Eskimo Joe will deliver on its national acoustic tour that includes Logan.

Joel Quartermain – one third of the much-loved WA alternative rock trio – is endearingly honest when describing the difference in delivering an acoustic set.

'Walking on for an acoustic show leaves you a bit exposed and a bit vulnerable, but it comes down to the delivery and relying on the strengths of the songs,' Joel says.

'An acoustic tour takes a lot of preparation – this show is completely different to how we normally play with a full rock band as part of this big machine making all this sound.'

Yet an acoustic set is familiar territory for Joel, who plays guitar, keyboards and drums, Kav Temperley as vocalist and bass guitarist, and Stuart MacLeod on lead guitar.

'We write songs with acoustic guitars rather than in a jam room at a billion decibels,' Joel says. They also played with a 48-piece orchestra in 2018 at Sydney Opera House.

'This tour gives us a chance to rebirth the songs in a completely different guise so there's a bit more creativity involved. It's going to be an all-encompassing look back at our catalogue and rearranged in a different way,' he says.

'There's that real value in nostalgia at the moment. People are going to those shows to celebrate songs that were big moments in their life – people tend to romanticise the past.'

That leads Joel to mention Eskimo Joe's new song *The First Time*, with the music video fast becoming a fan favourite for highlights from past videos such as the band kidnapping themselves for *Black Fingernails*, *Red Wine*.

"When you dig into the lyrical content of *The First Time* it talks about an old relationship,' Joel says.

They have also just celebrated 20 years since their hit *From The Sea*. 'It's a big achievement, but it really reminds us of how long we've been friends, we are still in a band, and people still appreciate us playing shows.' They play at Logan Entertainment Centre on 31 May.

Exploring the historic local haunts

hen the night falls on Logan, a Jimboomba family ventures out to connect with its spiritual side.

Mother Elise, her daughters Kahlia and Tiana and son Brady, have all taken on an unexpected role of hosting ghost tours around Logan's historic locations.

The family began the unusual hobby several years ago by visiting haunted sites around Australia to satisfy their own curiosity about all things ghostly.

They soon learned many others wanted similar experiences, when launching their business last year.

Called Transcendental Paranormal, the business has quickly grown to now run tours every couple of weeks.

With each event now being solidly booked ahead, and waiting lists forming for up to 60 people, the family has also welcomed a like-minded assistant. Josie.

'We've had many things happen – seeing a figure walking back and forth in a dance hall, hearing things, shirts being grabbed – when we visit places

like a historical village or museum, or local cemeteries with lots of history,' Tiana says.

'People have felt things like a little girl's energy in a child's room, and our specialised equipment has gone crazy,' she says.

'Then we have had messages coming through that she was murdered there, but we can't find any historical information confirming that because it doesn't go back that far into the 1800s when she was alive.'

Tiana says their tour guests enjoy

using the unusual equipment on offer during the 3-hour events, ranging from communications devices called 'spirit boxes', to heat signature metres and electromagnetic field readers.

'We also have dowsing rods similar to what water diviners use. When you ask questions, a spirit can move them to answer "yes" or "no".

'Some people don't believe in this and we respect their opinions, but ask in turn that they respect our beliefs.'

Animals help students reach their potential

no support students with complex needs, a school in Carbrook has turned to a curriculum that includes student wellbeing, individualised education and a timid Palomino pony named Daisy.

A group of animals - including horses, dogs, chickens and a pig - play an important part at Carbrook Animal Assisted Learning Centre, a special assistance secondary school for students who were previously disengaged from education.

The school operates based on the understanding that students who live with a disability or different socio-emotional needs often struggle to fit in at school, leading to disengagement.

According to Principal Anna Borneman, many students have never realised their full potential.

'When students feel safe and have a sense of belonging in the school environment, learning really takes off and happens,' she says.

Darani Cumming, an equestrian coach and the centre's Animal Assisted Learning Program Coordinator, says students can learn vital skills such as self-confidence and emotional regulation from animals like horses.

'As herd animals, horses are great models because they help students learn things about themselves, how community works and what it means to be trustworthy and safe,' she says.

'Horses can pick up on your energy - the way you move, the way you speak, even your posture.

'We focus on teaching the students how to be kind, firm and confident leaders when taking care of the animals.'

A good example of this is Daisy more skittish than the other horses - who requires students to practise being calm around her.

The school's 84 per cent student attendance rate indicates that previously disengaged students are benefiting from the school's unique approach to education and the animal-human connection.

pringwood Road State
School opened in January
1974 against the backdrop
of the Brisbane floods – but
its sodden beginning has not

Better paths and connections for Springwood

Improved intersections and safer streets for active and healthy lifestyles are on the way in Springwood as 3 important projects take shape.

Fitzgerald Avenue is being revitalised through a \$3.1 million streetscaping project, which includes trees and shelters, a wider footpath and removing a median strip to create more space for cyclists and pedestrians.

Access to all businesses in the work zone – between Cinderella Drive and Rochedale Road – is being maintained.

Division 1 Councillor Lisa Bradley says the streetscaping will bring a new vibrancy to the shopping and business precinct.

'It will unlock opportunities to close the street for events as well as encouraging outdoor and night-time dining in the new-look space,' Cr Bradley says.

The project is funded by the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program and Logan City Council, including Division 1 Local Infrastructure Program funding.

Meanwhile, a new shared pathway will link with existing bikeways branching off Cinderella Drive to connect with public transport, shops and Springwood Park.

The Cinderella Drive Shared Path Upgrade project is supported by the Queensland Government's Cycle Network Local Government Grants Program.

Intersections are also being improved with upgraded traffic signals at Cinderella Drive and Dennis Road, and Barbaralla Drive and Dennis Road.

Also, a new turning lane at the intersection of Onak Crescent and Dennis Road will improve traffic flow.

Jared – a former participant – says Man Up meetings are a safe place for men to open up.

'Each week is a different topic. It's about unpacking all the stuff you might have been brought up with... (and) sharing whatever is holding you back,' Jared says.

Upgrade improves state school safety

Pedestrian safety and traffic flow have been improved outside Logan Village State School.

Sections of Storey Road and Manuka Road are now widened as part of recent upgrade works, including new stormwater infrastructure and kerbing.

The Makos' territory gets safety upgrade

A fresh focus on safety around Queensland's biggest school is underway with an intersection upgrade.

The upgrade at the intersection of Chambers Flat Road and Muchow Road is outside Marsden State High School.

Marsden SHS, the home of the Makos, is booming.

Enrolments at the state's largest school have increased by 8 per cent over the past 2 years to take the school population to more than 4,000 students.

Division 5 Councillor Paul Jackson says the massive enrolment figure underscores the importance of road safety in the area.

'Council's upgrade to the intersection outside the school will boost safety for students, pedestrians and bike riders, as well as help improve traffic flow for motorists,' Cr Jackson says.

The works include new traffic signals for the left-hand turning lane from Muchow Road into Chambers Flat Road, while pedestrian ramps and walkways and existing concrete islands have been upgraded.

Pony club has the jump on cross-country course

ark Ridge Pony Club members are jumping for joy over a restored feature at their home ground in Judith Park, Crestmead.

A challenging multi-level log-based jump has been constructed by Logan City Council on a cross-country course being developed by the club.

The new jump is on a section of the course that was impacted by Logan Water laying critical pipeline infrastructure to service growing nearby suburbs.

Club secretary Angela McGillivray says interest in equestrian crosscountry competition is booming.

'Riders and their horses have to go as fast as they can and many find this type of competition a lot of fun,' Angela says.

The new jump has multiple levels that requires competitors and their mounts to jump up to an elevated flat surface and then get across another stack of logs to get back down.

Park Ridge Pony Club formed in 1969 and moved to Judith Park in 1979.

Angela says it now has more than 40 members of all ages who compete in cross-country, showjumping and dressage.

Division 5 Councillor Paul Jackson says equestrian sports and recreation are an important part of the Logan lifestyle.

'Many of our suburbs include rural areas where some families have kept horses for many generations,' Cr Jackson says.

'Equestrian sports are one of the few where men and women compete together and they are also part of the Olympics and Paralympics.

'It would be terrific if we had someone competing in the 2032 Games in Brisbane who once honed their riding skills at Judith Park in Crestmead.'

Angela's pride and joy is a gelding she calls Ponga. Now 7 years old, the former racehorse competes as Cool Under Fire.

Angela no longer rides competitively due to injury, but young club members Anika Barrett and Emily Wonka share Ponga to compete in cross-country, showjumping and hacking.

'I get a thrill out of watching them all compete,' she says.

Currently, motorists wanting to enter Park Ridge Road from either Clarke or Lindenthal roads are faced by stop signs and required to give way in all directions.

Division 8 Councillor Jacob Heremaia says there has been a steady rise in traffic volumes through the 4-way intersection because of considerable population growth and development in Park Ridge and surrounding areas.

'We've worked together as a community for this upgrade. It is fantastic to see funding allocated and I'm looking forward to seeing construction begin,' Cr Heremaia says.

The project will include a signalised pedestrian crossing, the installation of traffic lights, and green-painted bicycle lanes will be added on the approaches to Park Ridge Road.

Work is expected to begin mid-2024.

Everyone gets their own shot at being cool

anah Merah mum Tanya Dennis loves that her 21-yearold son is socialising, dancing, bowling and making new friends.

But the difference to many mums in the same situation is that her son Jaden has high-level disabilities, is non-verbal and uses a wheelchair.

The loving bond between the pair, and their shared determination for Jaden to build an interesting life for himself after he left school, resulted in the creation of an amazing community-based program in 2021 called MYCoolEVENTS.

The program coordinates regular events and outings for those with a disability to mingle and have fun in public spaces that are safe and controlled to meet their many needs.

Events include dances, drumming sessions, painting, free movies, writing e-books and disco ten-pin bowling. Participants attend with family members and/or support workers.

'Having a high-level disability does not mean you have to miss out,' is Jaden's message on the program's website. 'Groove to your own beat, sing out loud, move the way you want. Be yourself. You are epic.' Funded solely on donations and grants, MYCoolEVENTS has grown to have up to 40 people attending recent events.

'I am doing this through the eyes of my son by extending invitations to others like him who may want to be part of his world,' Tanya says.

'Our children are very fragile and too vulnerable to go to a lot of public spaces but by bringing them together in a safe space where every element has been considered and checked, allows them to have fun, connect with each other and make new friends.'

Division 10 Councillor Miriam Stemp says Tanya and Jaden have been inspirational in creating MYCoolEVENTS.

'I always enjoy attending their events and seeing the joy on the faces of everyone involved,' Cr Stemp says.

These include excursions, entertainment, hairdressing and activities such as bingo, indoor bowls and line dancing.


'There truly is something for everyone,' Megan says.
